Now we'd like to adopt a joint declaration to manifest the result of this Summit. Based on your presentations and discussions, a draft has been prepared. Now let's have it read and explained.

Prior to reading the draft for the declaration, I'd like to give you a brief explanation. So that you may examine the draft in advance, I already passed papers to you. Some modifications, however, have been requested by several cities, and three points have already been modified in the sentences I'll read out later. All of them are in the first paragraph.

Now I'd like to read the draft.

The world is currently laced with strong interdependent relationships. The Asian-Pacific, as one region, is further intensifying this interdependency. Flows of people, information and commodities are constantly on the move. Concurrently with international exchange at the national level, the era is steadily changing in direction towards promotion of international exchange by cities and regions, under exchange conducted at the national level. This exchange by cities and regions also includes everyday and specific problems. It can be said that the peace and stability of the world from now on depends on how diverse networks between cities and regions are formed. At the Asian-Pacific City Summit (three days, September 22-24, 1994) advocated by Keiichi Kuwahara, the Mayor of Fukuoka City, we held detailed discussions regarding closer mutual cooperation to establish "Harmony between Urban Development and the Human Living Environment" with representatives from 21 cities from 11 countries and regions along with the participation of the United Nations. Furthermore, at the summit we were able to mutually reach understanding of the different situations each city faces and also reach several common understandings.

Although this is just one small step forward, it is a giant step for participating cities in the summit in search of a strategy of world peace. At the closing of the summit,

we hereby present a "Fukuoka Declaration" based on the mutual and common understandings reached in the meeting. This will serve as a key to open up the future of the Asian-Pacific region.

- 1. Cities are making rapid developments following spectacular economic growth in the Asian-Pacific region. On the other hand, urban problems related to transportation, housing, environment and public health are also on the rise. The Asian-Pacific region is blessed with abundant natural features and resources. For the future sustainable development of the region, it is essential to maintain harmony between economic growth and the preservation of nature while pursuing city improvement and a more attractive human living space.
- 2. Current urban problems are unparalleled in history in their speed and development. These problems are too difficult to be solved by a country or by a city alone. Due to such reasons, it is imperative for participating cities in the summit to share their multifarious knowledge and experience, and cooperate with each other for the promotion of sound development of their cities and urban policies.
- 3. Close cooperation and links among cities can only be intensified through mutual understanding and friendship. Using the momentum generated by this summit, it is necessary for industry, school and government to create diverse and multi-layer exchange programs, maintaining the importance of "face to face" and "heart to heart" exchanges.
- 4. In order to jointly deal with the above-mentioned subjects, we are aiming to build a "human network among the Asian-Pacific cities." We have decided to continue holding this summit and to establish its secretariat in Fukuoka City. The word, "Manabi-ai" (learn each other) conjures up an image of equality and will be utilized as a keyword in the model of inter-regional cooperation, and will hopefully create a new frontier in international exchange.

Finally, with this summit as a starting point, we sincerely hope that these initial efforts will spread like a ripple in a pond towards establishing the "Harmony between Urban Development and Human Living Environments."

With the participation of mayors and other officers representing 21 cities from 11 nations and regions in the Asian-Pacific area, we held the first Asian-Pacific City Summit here in Fukuoka. Since September 22, we held discussions to deepen relationships and to form a stable network among cities.

Thanks to the cooperation of the participating cities, the summit was very successful. We have decided to hold the summit regularly as a model project for local communication, and to hold the next summit in Guangzhou City.

To express the great results of the summit this time, we have drafted an Asian-Pacific City Summit Fukuoka Declaration which I'd like to introduce to you now.

To be given the privilege to deliver the closing remarks in behalf of my fellow mayors of 21 cities from eleven nations in this part of the globe who are participants in the

With the unity of purpose, binding us together, we expect within the immediate future not only economic prosperity, but also we will witness the birth of a region, people with happy, contented and prosperous individuals. Also we will equally witness a peaceful and stable community, and ultimately the full flowering of our people and region. Although we come from different customs and traditions, we can say that this Asian-Pacific City Summit attained and achieved unity in diversity, and diversity in unity among the delegates.

Mr. Li Ziliu, Mayor of Guangzhou

Thanks to the efforts of the host city Fukuoka and all the participants, we are now about to close the 1st Asian-Pacific City Summit which has been a great success. Representing Guangzhou City, I would like to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to Mayor Kuwahara and all the participants.

As included in the Fukuoka Declaration, I believe that we can deepen mutual understanding of the conditions in each city through discussions covering a wide range of topics, thereby creating harmony between city development and the living environment and establishing networks between cities. We can also achieve common recognition of sound development for cities, and the policies necessary to implement it. This experience could be an important step toward reinforcing the liaison between the cities in the region, to enhancing the development of city economies, and to addressing city problems. Moreover, it was decided to continue the summit in the future with the unanimous agreement of all the participating cities. This is an indication of their expectations of the summit. We are very happy to host the 2nd summit in 1996, with the support and commitment of the participating cities. But we are able to participate and direct in this very positive way that we've done over the past few days has been something that has been something that has been both a challenge and a very exciting experience. Prof. Krisda Arunvongse, Governor of Bangkok

cities that grows very fast are very similar. It is the traffic congestion problem, it is the solid waste treatment, the housing, it is the environment of the city, the polluted air and the waste water in the waterways. These are the things that many of the city administrators who have been here have seen the problems before, and have solved them, so cities that are growing very fast that still have this problems will learn from the experience of the solution that has been tried. Mr. Li Ziliu, Mayor of Guangzhou

Mr. Matthias Yao Chih, Snr. Parliamentary Secretary, Singapore

We had two days of very good discussions, where we could learn from each other our experiences and share our knowledge. But perhaps what is more important is that this summit have given birth to a continuing series of discussions, both perhaps at the policy, as well as the technical levels. And I would like to congratulate Mayor Kuwahara on this very important initiative which will enable our cities in this region in the years to come perhaps to work up together concrete solutions to some of our

problems. We shall directly relevant to our situation and our faces of development. Singapore has been privileged to take part in this process, and to have learned from our friends of the region. Thank you.

Mr. Keiichi Kuwahara, Mayor of Fukuoka

There are two impressions which I now have in mind. First, I am very pleased as the planner, to receive comments from the cities that the summit was very successful. Since Yokatopia, the Asian-Pacific Exposition Fukuoka '89, cities in the Asian-Pacific region have been promoting communication with one another, especially in the fields of culture and arts. However, taking this a step further, we looked to see whether there would be something in the administrative field which could be of use to us. This was why we reached a plan to hold this "Asian-Pacific City Summit." With approval from 11 cities to hold the Summit, today we have had the pleasure of receiving their representatives who have traveled a long distance to visit Fukuoka. This itself made me think that the plan was a success. But, in addition to this, throughout the conference, we heard the opinion at all the subsessions that we should not end this program as a one-off event but must continue it.

As a consequence, we reached a conclusion that the Summit will be held in Guangzhou, two years later in 1996. I believe this fact proves the success of this Summit which makes me very pleased.

The other impression I have is, that this summit may be the first occasion of a self-governing body in which administrative exchanges took place among multiple countries to create a wider network, while in most occasions exchange takes place only between sister cities of two countries. In this respect, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all participating cities for your cooperation. Once this network is created, although the conference may be held only every other year, it would become possible to exchange information at any time or to carry out technical exchanges and support which was pointed out just awhile ago. And, what is important, is that an Asian-Pacific friendship be created through this network which would in turn contribute to the peace and development of the Asian-Pacific region. From such a viewpoint, I am very much satisfied with the successful results of the Summit. Than you very much for your attention.

The Summit held this year was limited to the Asian-Pacific region only, but Asia even in one word, indicates a wide area. This time we did not have any participation from cities of the Southwest Asian countries nor India and Bangladesh. In the future, is there any intention to invite them? Also, is there going to be a set goal of the number of cities to participate or do you think of just letting the number grow unlimited. We would like to ask Mayor Kuwahara's opinions regarding this matter.

Mr. Keiichi Kuwahara, Mayor of Fukuoka

It is a very difficult problem to decide up to which area we should include as participants in the Summit. When deciding the participants for the Summit this time, we first thought of the Asian-Pacific area, especially, of the coastal areas in the Asian region, there has been a very rapid growth or those areas which are involved with various urban problems. Among the many cities in those areas, we chose those cities which maintain a close relationship through being a sister city of Fukuoka or linked with Fukuoka by direct air routes. We thought it would be best because of various factors to hold the first Summit with cities who we already have a close relationship with.

Therefore, if there are cities in the future who have a desire to join the Summit, we are willing to welcome them after full consultation is made with members of the 11 countries who are here today or members from the main city in Kyushu.

Mr. Bambang Sukartino, Newsman

My name's Bambang Sukartino from Kompas Daily, Jakarta. My question is to Mr. Chairman, Mr. Kuwahara. As you mentioned before that for to follow this summit, it will be a technical joint cooperation, or technical joint action. What kind of the technical joint operation, or action? Could you please describe that step one. Secondly, as we know that the some cities in Asia have a sometimes a financial problem to maintain or to achieve the harmony of the urban development and human living environment, so to resolve this financial problem, is there any action, or joint action, or joint cooperation to solve that problem? Thank you.

Mr. Keiichi Kuwahara, Mayor of Fukuoka

As for technical assistance, we have agreed with the idea suggested by Pusan City to have a meeting at the practical level, as well as general conferences.

The details of such meetings are supposed to be discussed in the future. Pusan City requested to hold a meeting on transportation this time. Through consultation with people concerned, we'd like to put such ideas into practice in the form of technical assistance and technology meetings.

Fukuoka City is unable to offer concrete assistance for urban development because it is a mere local government. On the other hand, ODA (Official Development Assistance) could be a great force because it is conducted by the national government. We'd like to make a research to what extent we can utilize the system.

While mentioning so, we are willing to provide any cooperation we are able to, for the continuation of this conference.
