Welcome Address by Host

Mr. Hirotaro Yamasaki, Mayor of Fukuoka City

My name is Hirotaro Yamasaki, Mayor of Fukuoka City. On this occasion of the opening of the 5th Asian-Pacific City Summit, I'd like to extend a few words of greeting.

It is our great pleasure and honor to have convened the 5th Asian-Pacific City Summit here in Fukuoka, with the participation of delegates from 16 cities representing 11 foreign countries and seven cities from within Kyushu. I would like to extend a warm welcome to the delegates of the participating cities who have come all the way to Fukuoka. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the guests from the United Nations, the United Nations Human Settlements Programme, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Fukuoka Prefecture, and the Council of Local Authorities for International Relations as well as so many citizens who are with us today.

The 1st conference of the Asian-Pacific City Summit was held in Fukuoka City in 1994. Ever since, the summit has aimed at sharing experiences and knowledge among cities in the Asian-Pacific region and forming an inter-city network for mutual cooperation in order to solve various urban problems that accompany city development. During the summit, we will discuss what urban administration should be under the plenary session theme of the "New Approach to City Planning for the 21st Century - from 'Governing' to 'Good Governance'". In past meetings, emphasis was placed on the importance of city building in collaboration with citizens to keep sustainable development while solving various urban problems including environmental ones. Therefore, at this conference, "City Planning with Citizen Involvement", "Customer-Based and Results-Oriented Governmental Reform", "e-Governance~IT & City Planning~" and "Collaboration among Industry, Academia and Local Government" are set forth as the Sub session themes. By discussing how to promote the development of a city governed by both the government and citizens, which is the effort made toward better governance in Asian-Pacific cities, from various viewpoints under these themes, we will not only exchange our extensive opinions on city administration suitable for the 21st century but also explore possibilities of

inter-city cooperation for better governance.

I believe that frank opinions and extensive information from those who are engaged in solving problems every day as executive administration heads are highly helpful and suggestive not only for the participating cities but also many other cities in the world. I hope this summit meeting will contribute to the codevelopment of the Asian-Pacific cities and eventually to the peace, stability and prosperity of the world.

Lastly, I would like to express my appreciation to the people involved who have rendered their support and cooperation to the hosting of this conference, and wish all of those who are present here good health and progress.

Congratulatory Address by	Guest	

Mr. Hiromi Okamoto, Domestic Public Relations Division, Minister's Secretariat, Ministry of Foreign Affairs

Thank you for the kind introduction. My name is Hiromi Okamoto, Officer of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Minister's Secretariat, Public Relations Department. I would like to read a message from the minister, Ms. Kawaguchi.

I would like to extend my sincere congratulations on the opening of the 5th Asian-Pacific City Summit convened here, today, with the presence of mayors of cities in the Asian-Pacific region and other people involved. Asian-Pacific countries, especially East Asian countries, have a long historic tradition and unique culture, and have grown based on this cultural soil. Now, East Asia constitutes an important region of international society as the "growth center of the world".

Some people say that the Asian financial crisis that broke out in 1997 threw cold water on the myth of East Asian growth. However, I should say that the cold water rather made us realize the importance of establishing a firm cooperative framework in this region. Behind the crisis ran a flow of rapidly advancing globalization. The advancement of science and technology has enabled information to instantly travel all through the world and economic activities to be conducted regardless of national boundaries, physical distance or time differences. However, the financial crisis sounded an alarm to the international community on a negative aspect of globalization. It made Asian-Pacific countries awake to the need for establishing a strong cooperative framework in this region. Such practical regional cooperation is not limited to the financial field alone. Efforts towards grappling with shared problems and challenges in the region as a whole can be seen in various fields. One such effort is the "Japan-ASEAN Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Partnership", which was proposed by Prime Minister Koizumi this January and is being promoted by Japan.

In this growing trend of regional cooperation, I attended the 3rd ASEAN + 3 Foreign Ministers' Meeting held in Brunei and the 9th ARF Ministerial Meeting in July. During these meetings, I discussed with ministers of the member countries issues in extensive areas including anti-terrorist measures, the situations in the Korean Peninsula and East Timor, arms control, disarmament, and nonproliferation. And I stated our effort to promote cooperative relations to solve inter-regional problems. Also on August 12th, at the Initiative for Development in East Asia Ministerial Meeting in Tokyo, we had a frank exchange of opinions on what

development cooperation should be.

In addition to these initiatives at the national level, I understand that the participating cities in the Asian-Pacific region have made unremitting efforts at the local level to solve various problems brought about by the advancement of economic activities, population concentration and the urban environment. In order to solve these problems, it is important to build not only a network through information sharing but also inter-city cooperation. Thus, I believe it is truly significant and timely that leaders of the cities in the Asian-Pacific region have come together at this summit meeting to have lively discussions under a common theme. I am sure that especially inter-city collaboration towards solutions for urban problems and the establishment of a network for friendship, goodwill and mutual cooperation will make significant contributions to the long-term peace and prosperity of the Asian-Pacific region.

Lastly, I would like to conclude my greetings by wishing the 5th Asian-Pacific City Summit great success, the mayor of the hosting city of Fukuoka and the people present here good health, and all the participating cities further progress.

Thank you very much for the introduction. I am Wataru Aso, Governor of Fukuoka Prefecture. I'd like to congratulate the great opening of the 5th Asian-Pacific City Summit.

Also, through e-Asia Market Place and the Internet, we would like to conduct e-business with Asian countries, transcending

national boundaries. Furthermore, through Fukuoka Venture Market, which is organized by the prefecture every month for Asian venture companies, we are providing a springboard to venture businesses. Also, mainly in Kitakyushu City, we have much experience in the area of the environment. Building on that experience, we are trying to build an environmentally friendly, recycling-based society. Thus, we are working on establishing industrial technology, industries and a social system to achieve our goal. Governance that we are trying to establish in this century is city management through discussions among public sectors, private sectors and citizens, as well as an effort to achieve co-prosperity and sustainable development based on cooperation among cities in the world beyond national boundaries. From this viewpoint, and now that at any other time, it can be said that city governments have to implement extensive government reform under the new paradigm of governance.

Dear Delegates, thus I believe that the theme of this city summit, the "New Approach to City Planning for

the 21st Century - from 'Governing' to 'Good Governance' " is indeed timely. And this summit is very significant in that we can discuss what the new paradigm, which I mentioned, means specifically. I expect that with your strong support, we will be able to launch the Tourism Promotion Organization for Asian-Pacific Cities (TPO), which I proposed at the 4 th Asian-Pacific City Summit in Busan in order to actually put city governance into practice.

Here, please allow me to take this opportunity to ask for your attention and support for the "14th Asian Games Busan 2002", which will be held in Busan for two weeks from September 29, as well as the "Choir Olympics" organized after the games. I hope you will visit Busan.

Lastly, I would like to express my appreciation to all of those who have worked hard preparing for this meeting once again. And I sincerely wish this summit great success and all of you good health. Thank you.
